BILL WOULD INCREASE SNOWMACHINE REGISTRATION FEES

Rep. Mark Neuman (R – Big Lake) has introduced House Bill 23 to increase registration fees for snowmachines from \$10 for two years to \$20 for two years. Snowmachine registration fees go to the state Snowmobile Trails Program, which provides reimbursable, matching grant funds for trail easement acquisition, development and maintenance of trails and trail-related facilities for snowmobile use. The program also provides funds for snowmobile safety projects, though matching funds are not required for safety projects. The Snowmobile Trails Advisory Council (SnowTRAC) is responsible for reviewing and recommending funding for the Snowmobile Trails Program.

The Curry Ridge Riders snowmachine group commented on Neuman's bill on its Facebook page:

We support this action because we're the only self-funded user group in the General Fund of Alaska and awarded grooming dollars for the Snowtrac program as they are received by every one of us that register our sleds in the state registration program.

Times have changed, costs have gone up and we can't keep providing the kind of service so many of us are accustomed to at \$10 each per winter. If we do, we're going to have keep cutting back on grooming like we are now and noone likes that according to all the complaints lately.

Think about it....\$20 per winter for more groomed trails than you can ride on a tank of gas? That's pretty darned cheap too !

RESOURCES HELP REDUCE PET/TRAPPING CONFLICTS

Trapping season is here, so trail users who let their dogs run loose should make sure they know some



basic information about traps and trap lines. A pamphlet and videos are available.

PAMPHLET: A pocket-sized pamphlet titled "Trap Safety for Pet Owners" describes the types of traps and snares that may be encountered and provides illustrated instructions on how to free pets swiftly and safely. It is produced by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) and the Alaska Trappers Association (ATA). VIDEO: The ATA also sells a 30-minute video, "Sharing Alaska's Trails," that includes information such as how to know if you are on a trap line, trap line safety, the physics of handling and opening traps and snares, and tips for first-aid for pets accidentally caught in traps. The video doesn't promote trapping, but deals with the practicalities of sharing the trails. A three-minute excerpt of the DVD can be found on YouTube (www.youtube.com/watch?v=Jk242jZwEAQ). Most trapping seasons run from November 1 to the end of February, but the season for a few species lasts longer. Wolf traps could be active well into April.

ALASKA STUDENT CONSERVATION GROUP SEEKING APPLICANTS

Applications are being accepted for the 2019 AK Corps Teams for the Student Conservation Association (SCA) to work with multiple state and federal partners throughout Alaska. Work projects will be a mix of trail construction and maintenance, invasive species removal and fuels reduction for wildfire management. Project schedules will vary throughout the summer depending on partner's needs. Members can expect to use basic hand tools, power tools, and chainsaws. Teams consist of 5 members and 1 leader and this group of 6 will remain together for the entirety of the season. Season begins on May 13 with Corps Member Training. ALASKA GEOGRAPHIC HIRING FOR SUMMER FIELD SEASON

Alaska Geographic is currently hiring Summer Field Leaders for the 2019 summer season for a number of positions including Kayak Guide And Field Leader, Backpacking Field Leader, Youth Trail-Work Expedition Leader. All trips take place from June-August. Mandatory paid training will take place May 17-19.

Expeditions vary in length from 1 to 2 weeks. A full season of work is available for the right candidate. Field Leaders are required to have a current Wilderness First Responder (WFR) or Wilderness First Aid (WFA) medical certification, depending on the position. NUGGET CREEK TRAIL IN CHENA RIVER REC AREA FINALLY FROZEN

Nugget Creek Trail (in the Chena River State Recreation Area) has frozen sufficiently for winter travel. The trail begins at 31.4-mile Chena Hot Springs Road, on the right (south) side of the road. Follow the green trail markers down the access road to the Chena River. Carefully choose your crossing and then follow the green trail markers to the cabin. Be cautious as the Chena River and its south fork often have thin ice or open water even in late winter.

REZONE REQUEST NEAR CREAMER'S/ADMA TRAILS CAUSES CONCERN

A request to rezone property near the Creamer's Field/ADMA trails is causing a lot of discussion and concern among trail users and neighbors. The rezone is being requested by the property owner to enhance his snowmachine touring business, which has been operating in the area for a number of years. The rezone would allow him to keep his snowmachines at the property rather than truck them to the site for tours. Discussion by trail users and neighbors has generally been negative, though some people have spoken in favor of the proposal. The proposal was denied by the Fairbanks North Star Borough Planning Commission once, but it came before the Borough Assembly, which sent it back to the Planning Commission.
