Thanks to a Two for the Trails grant from Athletic Brewing Company, hardworking volunteers, and one of our paid trail crews, the Middle Fork Trail on the Prospect Heights side in Chugach State Park is in much better shape! Earlier this summer, Alaska Trail Stewards held two volunteer events and volunteers brushed

over a mile of trail starting from the Prospect Heights trailhead. They enjoyed Athletic Brewing non-alcoholic beverages after each event.

In addition, our paid trail crew worked in conjunction with a group of 11 volunteers from Overland Adventures to get the new Middle Fork Trail alignment finally open and operational. They completed a lot in one week: 1750 ft. of brushing (1/3 mile), 175 ft. of new tread construction, 6 new drains dug, 10 drains re-imagined and cleared out, and two large trees bucked and cleared off the trail.

A good portion of his work includes photographing rescued dogs for Friends of Pets. He is also the founder of 907Chip, an effort to build and place free dog and cat microchip scanning stations throughout

SouthCentral Alaska. David, and his 3-year-old Golden Retriever Iris, travel the state together for adventures in their 1931 Ford Model A pickup truck. When not on the trails, he and Iris are either working in his studio or volunteering as a Pet Partner's-certified therapy dog team at Pioneer Home of Anchorage.

September 10

This summer, an Alaska Trails paid trail crew, Youth Employment in Parks, and volunteers improved the

Moose Ridge Loop Trail in Far North Bicentennial Park over the course of five weeks! The crew constructed a reroute to maneuver around a growing stream and moved the trail up onto the top of a hill. They repaired a connector trail to the Moose Ridge Loop and added a boardwalk where the loop abutted a swamp. They also constructed a bridge. Here are some of the crew and volunteers' accomplishments on the trail:

- 300 ft new switchback
- 50 ft crushed rock causeway
- 20 ft long high-capacity milled stringer bridge
- 300 ft boardwalk



- 2.5 miles of trail brushed
- 17 major hazard trees removed
- Several hundred roots cut
- Several hundred feet of tread hardened with gravel

This project was made possible by many partners and funders. Partnerships with the Municipality of Anchorage and Anchorage Park Foundation were essential. A Republic Services grant funded the project for the season, sponsorships from Matson in Alaska and CRW Engineering Group, Inc. funded the volunteer events, a grant from the The Home Depot provided the wood for construction and two Home Depot volunteer work days, and a grant from the Alaska Community Foundation Anchorage Trail Care Fund supported the project. We are grateful for the community's support of this project, and we're excited to have revitalized a section of this incredible park that needed a little love. We hope you'll go check out the new trail improvements!

September 6

The Crow Pass Reroute is Open!

Good news for Crow Pass hikers: Alaska State Parks and Interior Trails LLC just finished a 1-mile



reroute on the north end of the trail, and it's now officially open! The new section starts about a half-mile past Echo Bend from the Eagle River Nature Center, avoiding the stretch that's eroding into the river.

The reroute climbs onto solid bedrock, offering wide-open views of the Eagle River valley and alpine ridges. A hike out to The Perch and back is about 9 miles round-trip — and right now the aspens are beginning to glow gold.

Big thanks to the trail crews for all their hard work! Alaska Trails helped secure this funding for the Chugach State Park as part

of our advocacy for Alaska Long Trail projects in the FY23 state capital budget.

The old route is still passable, but it won't be maintained going forward. Watch for new signs at the junctions.

RTP FUNDS WILL NOT GO SOLELY TO ALASKA STATE PARKS


Due to quick lobbying by advocates and intervention by Gov. Mike Dunleavy, a move to divert all Recreational Trails Program funds to Alaska State Parks has been stopped.

Lobbying efforts were made especially by Michele Stevens, president of the Alaska Snowmachine

Alliance, Lee Hart, founder of the Alaska Outdoor Alliance, and Rep. Kevin McCabe (Mat-Su).

The current system for the Recreational Trails Program (RTP) will stay in place. It allows nonprofit organizations, municipalities, and tribes to apply for grants along with state agencies, including state parks.

"This program is so important to Alaska trail users, both motorized and non-



Earlier in September, Rep. McCabe reported that the state of Alaska was changing the rules for the RTP, so that grants from it would be eligible only for "projects on state park lands and their access routes." If true, that would have been a big blow to nonprofits and municipalities across the state.




Photo by Geoffrey Orth: Recent work on the Ester Dome Singletrack Trails in the Fairbanks area is from an RTP grant.

ATTEND/COMMENT Open House public meetings will be held on the Denali Borough Separated Paths and Healy Area and School Pedestrian Path on the following dates:

(DOT&PF), in partnership with Denali Borough, proposes to design separated paths at the following proposed locations in the Denali Borough: Parks Highway Antler Ridge Parking Lot to Suntrana Avenue, Parks Highway Suntrana Avenue to Stampede Road, and Parks Highway Carlo Creek to Crabbies Crossing.

They also propose to design shared-use pedestrian paths at the following locations within the community of Healy: School Road between Healy Spur Road and Tri-Valley School, Suntrana Avenue from Tri-Valley

School to the Parks Highway, and Coal Street between Healy Spur Road and the Post Office.

These projects are currently in the preliminary design and environmental reconnaissance stage, and we would appreciate your comments. OUTDOOR REC TRAILS ADVISORY BOARD RECRUITING NEW MEMBER!

APPLY The Division of Parks and Outdoor Recreation is seeking a candidate to fill a volunteer position, representing diversified trail users, for the Outdoor Recreational Trails Advisory Board (ORTAB).

Applicants should have knowledge, experience, and interest in outdoor recreational activities and grant-funded programs. This is a commissioner-appointed position with a three-year term, and the board meets a minimum of twice per year. The application deadline is October 10.

APPLICATIONS FOR LWCF DUE BY END OF OCTOBER

APPLY Applications for the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) are available. This joint federal/state program is not specifically a trails program, but many trail projects have been funded by this program. It provides grants for projects that feature "close-to-home" outdoor recreational opportunities for the public.

Applicants are limited to state, regional or local governments, and federally recognized tribal governments, with the legal authority to provide park and recreation services on public lands are eligible to apply for LWCF assistance. However, nonprofit can also partner with eligible applicants to get projects funded.

SLOW CLIMATE CHANGE: ELECTRIC, HYBRID; STOP MONEY PIPELINE

Climate changes affect everyone, including trail lovers.

For summer trail lovers, climate change can bring more droughts, wildfires, flooding, and permafrost thawing. For winter trail lovers, a warming climate can mean shorter snow seasons, and more extreme events like snow droughts and rain-on-snow events. These impacts will get worse unless we slow climate change by reducing our greenhouse gas emissions.

Here are some things you can do right now to help make a difference.

Take a personal action

When buying a car, consider a hybrid or electric vehicle. Many come in AWD versions. Alaska organizations are working hard to install fast-charging stations for electric vehicles in high-use areas. Consumer Reports has an excellent guide

(<u>www.consumerreports.org/cars/hybrids-evs/buying-guide/</u>), but there are many others. Just let your Google fingers do the walking.

Trail Users, don't MOOSE around!



The crew at the Alaska Department of Fish and Game - Official has received reports of aggressive, rutting bull moose along Anchorage's trails.

It is moose rutting season, and that means bull moose are more moody, territorial, and unpredictable than usual. Anything seen as a threat can elicit aggressive behavior, and they can charge at any moment.

If a moose charges or is about to charge, run and get behind something solid, and keep it between you and the moose.

Signs you are too close for comfort:

- 1. Are its ears pinned against its head?
- 2. Are its hackles (hair on the back of the neck) up?
- 3. Is it licking its lips?

New Trail Alert – Crow Pass Reroute!





Alaska State Parks and trail contractor Interior Trails LLC has completed a 1-mile reroute on the northern end of the Crow Pass Trail, officially open this weekend!

Starting from the Eagle River Nature Center, the reroute begins just under a half-mile past Echo Bend. It bypasses a badly degraded section vulnerable to erosion, beaver activity, and high water.

The new route climbs gently onto bedrock ridges with incredible views of Eagle River and surrounding alpine terrain. A

round trip hike out to The Perch via the reroute is about 9 miles—perfect for enjoying the golden fall aspens.

⚠ The old trail remains open but will not receive future maintenance. Watch for signage at the new junctions.

Volunteers helped Eric and Andy finish up the last bit of brush before alpine on Monday, in the rain. The hired ACC workers spent most of the summer clearing the trail "and cleaning it up" so it will be easier to keep clear in the future.

In 2018 Sadie Knob was almost lost to the wilds, as it had grown in so much it was hard or



impossible to find the trail. State Parks did not have the resources to clear it and was going to "let it go". Volunteers stepped in and began to hack away at the 12' tall devils club growing IN the trail. We accidentally cleared several bear trails too- it was hard to tell the difference! (Otter Cove lodge offer free lodging for volunteers back then!)

Since then, Friends has had many volunteers working on it and held the Kachemak Bay Mountain Classic event on Sadie knob in 2022 and 2023. This 8-ish mile hike is less steep and about 1000' shorter than Grace Ridge so a more family friendly hike, plus you have the option to just go from North Eldred trailhead to South Eldred trailhead and not even go up to the peak. It is a beautiful place to camp at the top, with small ponds up there that only dry up when it's a really hot dry summer. Berry Picking is great both down low and up high.

Go & enjoy this beautiful less known trail that has been given a new chance because of volunteers!

Recently Friends Volunteers Kathy & Nathalia hiked to Emerald Lake (from Humpy Creek and back) to

check out the condition of the trail. It is hike-able to Portlock Plateau from the bottom (thanks to recent trail clearing efforts by volunteers) NOTE: The trail to the Plateau is VERY steep and a difficult hike to the Plateau, approx 2.8 miles up and 1800'+ elevation gain.

After the Plateau heading to Emerald Lake, the 2.5 mi trail is more of a route than a trail. Though the trail is mostly "findable", it is still very brushy and not for the faint of heart. Thanks to Volunteers in the fall of 2024, the



worst of the alders were removed from the trail between Emerald Lake and Plateau so at least you are not climbing over those, but there are still sections of heavy brush and some route finding required to stay on the trail to the Lake.

At the Lake they inspected the old trail towards Blue Ice and after about .3 miles had to turn around. That section of trail has 100s of trees that have fallen in it and the trail has disappeared, it is truly not passable and is not safe to attempt to hike. The name "Emerald Lake Loop is a misnomer for now until we get some volunteer sawyers to clear that section to Blue Ice. So, in summary Emerald Lake Loop is NOT a LOOP, but is a difficult & beautiful hike "out and back" from Humpy Creek side with the only cleared trail being to Portlock Plateau (about halfway to Emerald Lake).

WORK FINISHED ON ESTER DOME TRAILS UPGRADE PROJECT

Work has finished on the Ester Dome Singletrack Improvement Project.

The project has been a joint effort by the Fairbanks Cycle Club (FCC), Goldstream Sports, and Stray Dogs, LLC. The work was done by Fairbanks-based trail contractor Happy Trails, Inc.

Work included refurbishing portions of the trail tread, increasing the height and depth of banked turns, and adding mountain bike features, such as drops, rollers, and tabletop jumps. All difficult

features have bypasses for those who don't want to attempt them.



The FCC obtained a \$143,000 Recreational Trails Program grant for the project and worked with Goldstream Sports to raise funds for the required 10 percent match funding. The work was popular with local cyclists, so when the original planned work was nearly done, the FCC and Goldstream Sports held a last-minute match challenge fundraiser, raising more than \$15,000. The additional funds kept the trail crew on the job for several more days adding more features.

Saturday responding to trail damage!

At Boy Scout Beach, about ¾ mile in, a tree that had been stabilizing the trail bank fell over, taking part of the trail with it and exposing an AEL&P power line. We plugged the holes with logs and boulders, then capped it all off with gravel. The trail is now free of ditches and exposed lines!

On Horse Tram Trail, we hauled gravel about ½ mile from the Boy Scout Beach intersection to cover protruding geocell, adding an extra inch of gravel to protect both the trail and users. We also widened and re-graveled the start of the trail intersection to prevent weeds from taking over.

Check out the awesome trail transformation on Horse Tram Trail at the new CBJ cabin site! The crew just finished building the cabin platform ahead of cabin construction next season.

To get there, they cleared trees from the site (prepping the logs for firewood and turnpikes on the access trail), roped out, measured, and flagged the cabin footprint, grubbed out organics and leveled the ground, then stabilized the edges by hand-carrying rocks up from the beach. Finally, they excavated and spread beach gravel to fill the platform and added an additional layer of gravel to cap the surface before tamping everything down. Use caution if you're planning on riding today at the Under Thunder Bike Park. Some vandal(s) have



dragged dozens of logs and dead trees across the trails. I went out at dusk last night to clear the tree that had fallen across BTV and found piles of debris on a couple corners of the beginner's trail. It looked like the work of kids until I got onto BTV and found dozens of logs drug across the lower 1/4 of the trail. They were not windfall. These were old logs, dead trees and branches from the surrounding area and long enough to stretch all the way across the trail.

I cleared all of BTV but discovered the same handiwork when I got to the jump line exits. I cleared some of the wood but by then it was too dark and late to continue. I am planning on going back out this Saturday to take pictures and finish. If you decide

to ride today, know that you'll likely need to do a lot of log removal. Please take a picture of the vandalism before removing it. Everyone, keep your eyes open for whoever might be behind this. This is of particular concern for beginner and young riders who may not be able to stop in time as the obstructions begin in blind areas.
