GOV. DUNLEAVY ISSUES ORDERS TO ELIMINATE BOARDS

COMMENT Gov. Mike Dunleavy recently issued 12 executive orders, eliminating or reorganizing a wide

range of boards and commissions. One of those being eliminated is the Recreation Rivers Advisory Board. Also included for elimination is the Wood-Tikchik State Park Management Council.

Alaska Public Media has a story on the orders, which are causing concern amongst some lawmakers.

From the story: Through his communications staff, Dunleavy declined an interview for this story. But in a prepared statement, spokesperson Jessica Bowers said the purpose of the orders was to "make state government as efficient and effective as possible."



The Alaska Legislature can prevent them from becoming law. If you feel strongly about the executive orders, whether you support or oppose them, you should let your legislators know. 


KENAI-ANCHORAGE FOREST COMMITTEE SEEKS APPLICANTS

Anyone who uses area roads and trails should be aware of the plan and should comment if they feel a need.

Please read the details about the plan. Many people seem to jump to conclusions about what will happen if the plan is passed. Know that just because a road is on the plan doesn't mean it will necessarily be built. And this is NOT a call to action for the borough government to build these roads. It's just a plan to prepare for future possibilities. Please be knowledgeable before drawing any conclusions.
