ALASKA LONG TRAIL NEWS

These projects help advance completion of the Alaska Long Trail between Seward and Fairbanks, and they also improve the trail experience for people using shorter sections of the route. NEARLY 5 MILES OF NEW AND UPDATED TRAILS IN CHUGACH NATIONAL FOREST

A big piece of the Alaska Long Trail (AKLT) and the Iditarod National Historic Trail (INHT) was just

completed by the Chugach National Forest and is open for public use!

This segment is in the Victor Creek area, south of Moose Pass, and includes 2.5 miles of new trail, 2 miles of repairs to an existing trail, and a new 105-foot bridge over Victor Creek. The newly built trail travels through a spruce/hemlock forest with intermittent views over Kenai Lake and the surrounding peaks.

The trail is best accessed from Victor Creek Trail: https://tinyurl.com/w2fh3nft. About 1 mile from the trailhead, Victor Creek Trail crosses the newly built segment of the INHT, roughly at the halfway point. Head south on about 2 miles of reconstructed trail towards Snow River, or head north on about 2.5 miles of new trail towards Ptarmigan Campground.

The section of the new trail north of Victor Creek Trail currently dead ends at a small waterfall, but work is underway to extend it further. A separate trail construction contract is ongoing – as that work is complete, it will extend the newly opened trail another 3 miles or so to Ptarmigan Campground, which will create 11.5 miles of continuous completed trail along the Moose Pass Trail segment of the INHT. These additional miles are on schedule to be open by the beginning of the 2026 summer season.

DENALI STATE PARK TRAILS GOT SOME NEEDED HEAVY-DUTY BRUSHING

In late July, Alaska Trails' crew spent eight days clearing brush on portions of the Cascade (2.5 mi) and Little Coal Creek (1.2 mi to beaver pond) connectors to Kesugi Ridge as part of our effort to keep up with maintenance of key existing Alaska Long Trail segments. Both trails were extremely brushy, having





received no repair or maintenance in the last 10 years. A large portion of the trails required a chainsaw team to work ahead of the weed eater crew to keep pace.

Along the Cascade trail, thick birch and alder nearly overgrew the trail completely as the trail climbs. Some parts of the switchbacks saw significant delays because the weed eater crew could not cut through the birch without first sending the chainsaw team to make the route passable. In the future, the trail may need another substantial clearing by chainsaw to allow

for weed eater maintenance to take place on a yearly basis.

Along Little Coal Creek, the trail winds through a largely blue spruce forest that suffered an infestation of beetles around 5 years ago, leaving the trail to snake its way through thousands of dead standing trees. The situation is steadily getting worse as the number of downed trees that need to be logged out will soon be in the low triple digits as more and more of the dead standing spruce fall down.

Kesugi Ridge and its connectors are key parts of the Alaska Long Trail, and the funding to do this maintenance came from the Alaska Long Trail pool of money to plan the trail through the Mat-Su. Alaska Trails is grateful to the Rasmuson Foundation and the Mat-Su Trails and Parks Foundations for these funds.

We Love Improving Trails, But Only if You Get Out to Enjoy Them



What a summer! Southcentral Alaska has been treated to a truly spectacular summer of sunshine and warm temperatures. While the landscape might be begging for rain, I have certainly enjoyed the dry trails during this extended stretch of mild weather. Now that the Alaska State Fair has kicked off, fireweed has gone to cotton, and the kids have returned to school, the end of summer is here, but it is certainly not the end of our trail season! With fall colors right around the corner, it is one of my favorite times to get out and enjoy our incredible trails and trail systems.

If you're trying to decide what trail to tackle next, perhaps get out and enjoy one of the trails that Alaska Trails and partners have improved this summer.

- In Chugach State Park, the Williwaw Lakes Trail got a major facelift thanks to one of our hardworking crews and funding from the Chugach Park Fund. We keep hearing from delighted
 - community members who just can't believe that they don't have to wallow through the mud on their way back toward Williwaw Lakes.
- If you're on your way to Seward, stop in the Moose
 Pass area and check out the newly maintained
 section of the Iditarod National Historic Trail from
 Snow River to Victor Creek, the epic bridge across
 Victor Creek, and the new section of trail north of the
 bridge that will soon connect to Ptarmigan Creek.
 The improvements to the Southern Trek of the
 Iditarod National Historic Trail like these are an
 exciting collaboration of the U.S. Forest Service,
 nonprofits, and trail builders, largely due to federal
 funding secured through Senator Murkowski's office
 and trail advocates.
- If you're visiting Denali State Park (DSP), check out the long overdue improvements to the Cascade and Little Coal Creek trails. One of our crews spent two

- weeks clearing brush, vegetation, and downed trees from these trails, paid for with Alaska Long Trail fundraising efforts since the state has failed to sufficiently fund trail maintenance in DSP in recent years.
- Or if you find yourself in Girdwood, check out the rehabilitated Middle Iditarod Trail. Our crew and community volunteers have turned a formerly wet, muddy, flooded, and slippery trail into a delightful (and dry!) experience for residents and visitors.

While we are absolutely psyched about these and other trail improvements we've seen this summer, there is still lots of work to do! Our professional trail crews will be working hard until late September,

and you still have the chance to volunteer to improve the trails you love! We have several upcoming volunteer events in Chugach State Park, Hatcher Pass, and Whittier that need helping hands!

As fall approaches, our Trail Tales event series will make its return on Tuesday, October 7, and our Fall Fundraiser is happing on Thursday, October 9, at Hilltop Ski Area. I hope to see you at these events, but most of all, I hope to run into you out on the trails!

APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR RECREATIONAL TRAILS PROGRAM

APPLY The Alaska Division of Parks and Outdoor Recreation (DPOR) is accepting grant applications for the Recreational Trails Program. The Recreational Trails grant program provides up to 90% matching for the cost of a project.

Funding for the program comes from the Federal Highway Administration, which has awarded Alaska more than \$22 million for more than 570 projects since 1993.

Recreational Trails Program applications are due by Oct. 31, 2025. Mandatory public notices must be posted by September 30.

Eligible applicants include non-profit organizations, educational institutions, State of Alaska, local and federal government entities, native corporations and tribal governments. Interested parties can register on



IRIS. The grants will be awarded between February and May of 2026.

K'ESUGI RIDGE TRAIL IN DENALI STATE PARK IS COMPLETE

Often called the crown jewel of hikes within the Alaska State Park system, the K'esugi Ridge Trail offers sweeping ridge line views, alpine tundra, and a front-row seat to Denali—without the need for permits or crowds. Traversing through Denali State Park, this trail system invites you to choose your own adventure, from a scenic day hike to a multi-day backcountry journey.

The completed Curry Ridge Connector Trail is a welcome addition to the Denali State Park trail system. It connects the Lower Curry Trail to the K'esugi Ridge Trail from K'esugi Ken Campground to Little Coal Creek, over 50 miles. Trailheads starting from the Parks Highway (North to South):

- Little Coal Creek Mile 163.9
- Ermine Hill Mile 156.5
- Byers Lake Campground Mile 147
- Troublesome Creek Mile 137.2
- Kesugi Ken Campground (Curry Ridge access) Mile 135.4

APPLICATIONS FOR LWCF DUE BY END OF OCTOBER



APPLY Applications for the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) are available. This joint federal/state program is not specifically a trails program, but many trail projects have been funded by this program. It provides grants for projects that feature "close-to-home" outdoor recreational opportunities for the public.

Applicants are limited to state, regional or local governments, and federally recognized tribal governments, with the legal authority to provide park and recreation services on public lands are eligible to apply for LWCF assistance. However, nonprofit can also partner with eligible applicants to get projects funded.

TAKE CARE ON TRAILS AS HUNTING SEASON APPROACHES

As we get into hunting season, please take care while using trails and while hunting and target practicing. This is not just a hunting season issue, but there is typically more gun activity this time of year.

The vast majority of gun owners are responsible with shooting. Unfortunately, some are less responsible, such a target practicing without a proper backstop or along a trail.

The chances of something happening are low. However, the consequences could be very high: death or wounding. Don't worry unnecessarily but do take care. Here are some resources:

We Need to Talk About Poop... Literally.

Yeah, it's awkward, but it's also super important. In Alaska State Parks, "Leave No Trace" applies to all your traces. Whether you're hiking in the backcountry or trail running within your favorite state park, here's how to do it right:

F Know Your WAG Bags

In fragile spots (alpine, riverbanks, canyons), burying isn't enough. WAG bags turn waste into safe gel you carry out. Bag it, don't wing it. You pick up your dog poop, right? Right?

Why Bother?

Unlike wildlife scat, human waste carries pathogens that can pollute water, spread disease, and linger for years. Yikes.

Pack a Poop Kit

Trowel, TP, sanitizer, and a WAG bag or trash bag. Better prepped than panicked.

- **b** Do the (Toilet) Right Thing
- 1) Find the right spot.
- 2) Dig.
- 3) Do your business.
- 4) Cover & disguise (no TP left behind!).
- 5) Wash those hands.



When nature calls, answer responsibly no excuses, no mess, no regrets. The photo taken is right off the trail. Let's be respectful to nature and the rest of the park users. Leave no trace... except maybe your footprints.

Big News for Chugach State Park Access!

A missing link is now connected! Great Land Trust led a major land acquisition in partnership with



the Alaska Division of Parks & Outdoor Recreation (Alaska State Parks) to permanently protect 147 acres in Potter Valley that will now be managed as part of Chugach State Park.

This project secures a new public access connection via the Stewart Trail, fulfilling a decades-long community vision. The land was previously owned by The Alaska Zoo and Alaska Botanical Garden and is rich in wildlife habitat, wetlands, and trail potential.

It's a win for conservation, public access, two beloved local nonprofits, and future generations of Alaskans and visitors! Trail access is now protected, but parking remains limited, so please plan accordingly and respect neighborhood signage.

ALERT: Temporary Trail Closures Due to Increased Bear Activity

Several trails in Far North Bicentennial Park and the BLM Campbell Tract are temporarily closed due to increased bear activity. Trail closures include Rover's Run, a section of Viewpoint Trail, and Salmon Run Trail. While bears can be encountered on any Anchorage-area trail, the current level of activity around these specific trails presents a higher safety concern.



This is a proactive step, made in coordination with our partners at Alaska Department of Fish and Game - Official and Bureau of Land Management - Alaska, to help keep both people and wildlife safe.

In late July, our Alaska Trails crew spent 8 days tackling major brush clearing on portions of the Cascade (2.5 mi) and Little Coal Creek (1.2 mi) connectors to Kesugi Ridge—key segments of the Alaska Long Trail.

These trails hadn't seen maintenance in over 10 years, and it showed!

Cascade: Thick birch and alder nearly swallowed the trail as it climbed. Some switchbacks were so overgrown that our weed-eater crew had to wait for the chainsaw team to cut through before they could even start.

Little Coal Creek: Winding through a beetle-killed spruce forest, the trail now faces hundreds of downed trees as dead standing spruce continue to fall. Keeping these trails open is a big job—and Kesugi Ridge is a major piece of the Alaska Long Trail, so this work matters! Huge thanks to the Rasmuson Foundation and the Mat-Su Trails & Parks Foundation for funding this effort.

WORK CONTINUES ON ESTER DOME TRAILS UPGRADE PROJECT

DONATE Work started in August and will continue into mid- or late-September on the Ester Dome Singletrack Improvement Project.

The project is a joint effort by the Fairbanks Cycle Club (FCC) and Goldstream Sports. The work is being done by Fairbanks-based trail contractor Happy Trails, Inc.

Work includes refurbishing the tread of the approximately 10 miles of the trail system and adding mountain bike features, such as drops, rollers, and tabletop jumps. All difficult features will have bypasses for those who don't want to attempt them.



The FCC obtained a \$143,000 Recreational Trails Program grant for the work and has done additional fundraising along with Goldstream Sports. The FCC is still collecting donations for the work.

--Guttenberg said establishing the trail would help economic development and tourism in the borough, including a potential boost in hotel/motel bed tax revenue.

"The amendment doesn't require us to do anything, it just says we support it ... it's low impact, high return," Guttenberg said. "We've had resolutions in the past supporting trails, including the Long Trail."

Kelly, a strong trails advocate, added that "long trails do bring to communities economic development." She noted it vitalize the state's outdoor recreation industry and add new jobs.--

- Turned a problem they discovered while hiking into a full-circle project that now benefits every recreator who passes through Granite Tors.


We also spotted huckleberries, cloudberries, nagoonberries, blueberries, and salmonberries, with highbush cranberries just starting to ripen.



HAINES HUTS AND TRAILS

If you hiked the Ripinski Trail from the Skyline/Young Road Trailhead any time in the past few years, you'll probably remember all of the boardwalks and staircases throughout the first mile of the trail. Many of these



were installed over 15 years ago, with some sections dating back 50+ years, as was evident by their condition... We saw collapsing infrastructure as a pretty dire safety issue on one of the most popular trails in Haines and decided to address the issues for our first big trails project.

Thanks to a Rasmuson Foundation grant that funded the labor, Chilkat Valley Community Foundation and Rural Alaska Community Action Program, Inc. grants to buy the tools needed, and Borough support for the materials, we spent the past 3 weeks replacing all the degraded sections

of trail with new "step and run" boardwalks, bridges, and staircases. We started by tearing out all the old structures that needed replacing, then flying in nearly 6,000lbs of pressure-treated lumber to three different sites along the first mile of trail. Then, over the following two weeks, a crew of three worked to build hundreds of feet of new boardwalk sections, re-seat/re-build old wobbly areas, a re-route the worst section

of trail out of a streambed. The project concluded right in time for the Takshanuk Ridge Run, whose runners were treated not only to a recently brushed 7-Mile Saddle trail, but also to a much drier, stabler, and safer final mile of trail.

A huge THANK YOU to Craig Franke at Community Waste Solutions for donating disposal of the thousands of pounds of lumber from the old infrastructure, to Clear Water Plumbing and Heating for hooking us up with rebar for the boardwalks, to Drew Elegante for volunteering many hours to attach shingles so the wood isn't slippery, to Anissa Berry for donating pressure treated wood, and to all of our other supporters for donating to projects like this one!

The groups received \$150,000 to award more projects this year compared to previous years.
