This presentation will provide an overview of the project as well as a round table discussion with the project partners including: Huddle AK, Interior Trails, and Parks and People LLC. The presenters will share how they solicited stakeholders' environmental values in developing a nature-based community recreation area. The master plan, the trails and other facilities all incorporate the community's values. The conceptual framework for investigating the range of attitudes toward nature and the findings from the Meals Hill Master Plan survey will also be explored. The panel will also share how they translated the findings into actionable planning practices. With the master plan adopted, City of Valdez completed a comprehensive funding strategy with the intention of leveraging alternate funding sources.

Their mission is to create a community committed to constructing, promoting, and protecting the CDT, which stretches from Canada to Mexico, through Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico.	
9:30-11:30am	Alaska Long Trail Work Session: Identifying routes, uses, and gaps from Seward to Fairbanks This session will start the process of bringing together diverse stakeholders to brainstorm, discuss, and identify the Alaska Long Trail gaps, routes, and uses from Seward to Fairbanks. While a lot of work has been done by partners along the proposed route in the past year, many questions remain unanswered, and the bulk of the planning work is still ahead of us. Over the course of the next year, this planning work will be carried out in local and regional working groups along the envisioned length of the trail. The working groups will comprise local governments, trail users, communities, trails organizations, tourism representatives, non-profits, Alaska Native entities, businesses, and public land management agencies. This includes addressing needs for infrastructure such as parks and trails, open space acquisition, and broader strategies for funding, marketing, and partnership building. A multi-agency team and a large group of volunteers have been working on developing content for the SCORP over the past year. This session will give an update and next steps for this document.
