VIRTUAL RACE ACROSS ALASKA BENEFITS YOU AND ALASKA TRAILS

ENTER/DONATE The Race Across Alaska Winter Challenge, a multi-sport challenge, is a great way to get outside while challenging yourself to stay happy and healthy during winter. And you'll be helping our cause to help build and maintain some of the best trails in the world!

Here's how it works. You can run, walk, fatbike, indoor bike, XC ski or swim 125 miles, 225 miles, 350 miles, 850 miles, or 2,000 miles. The goal is to log as many miles as you can over the three months of winter, doing any of six sports to get (virtually) from location A to B:

- 125 miles = Anchorage to Seward, AK, that's 1.4miles/day
- 225 miles = Anchorage to Homer, AK, that's 2.5miles/day
- 350 miles = Anchorage to Fairbanks, AK, that's 3.9miles/day
- 850 miles = Anchorage to Deadhorse, AK, that's 9.5miles/day
- 2,000 miles = Ketchikan to Deadhorse, AK, that's 22.3miles/day



You will have the ability to log your miles, track your progress, collect virtual badges, so how you rank up to others on the leader board daily. You ca invite other to this challenge to help you to stay motivated all winter long.

The challenge will start on December 21, the first day of winter and continue through March 20.

The challenge is a fundraiser for the Alaska Trails development of the Alaska Long Trail, too! For every racer that participates, \$10 will be donated to Alaska Trails, plus racers can donate additional funds to support the development of the Alaska Long Trail.

The challenge will have a Zoom Kickoff Party on December 21 at 4:30pm AK Time (8:30pm EST) to cheer everyone on, go over the details and wish everyone luck. GET OUT ON THE TRAILS TO RECREATE BUT DO SO RESPONSIBLY

Are you in the know for snow? At the start of the pandemic in the United States, the #RecreateResponsibly campaign became the go-to resource for how to get outside responsibly. As seasons change, so do our

practices to stay safe outside and to protect the places we play.

Winter is a beautiful time, but with the new season comes new challenges and safety considerations to take into account. The winter environment changes quickly and access points may be more limited. We want everyone to be able to enjoy this incredible time



of year, and we want you to stay safe while doing it. Check out these tips to gauge your winter safety awareness, and do your research to #RecreateResponsibly this season.

- Know Before You Go Some areas can become dangerous with winter conditions. Research your destination, as roads and facilities may be closed in winter.
- Practice Physical Distancing Be prepared to cover your nose and mouth. When possible, opt to eat and rest outside. If you feel sick, stay home.
- Plan Ahead Check local conditions and prepare for the elements, packing extra layers, waterproof clothing, and avalanche safety gear for the backcountry.
- Play It Safe Know your limits and your gear. Slow down and choose lower-risk activities to reduce your risk of injury.
- Explore Locally Consider exploring locally, as driving and parking may be more challenging in winter. If you travel, be mindful of your impact on Native and local communities.
- Leave No Trace Did you know that the snow is our water supply? Keep our winter playgrounds clean. Pack out any human or pet waste. Be respectful of the land.
- Build an Inclusive Outdoors Everyone deserves to experience a winter wonderland. Be an active part of making the outdoors safe, accessible, and welcoming for all identities and abilities.

Alaska State Parks annual pass: Support state parks during a time of tight state budgets. Day-use



passes are \$60 and, of course, your parking is then paid for when you park at a state parks trailhead that requires a fee. Passes are good for the calendar year. COMMENT SOUGHT ON KACHEMAK BAY PARKS MANAGEMENT PLAN

COMMENT The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking public review and comment on a final revision of the Kachemak Bay State Park and Kachemak Bay State Wilderness Park Management Plan.



"The Kachemak Bay region possesses unique wilderness and scenic values that are ecologically important," said DNR Commissioner Corri A. Feige. "This plan encourages recreational activities on state-managed land in the area, while protecting their unique assets far into the future. Our team has worked very hard with residents and other interested parties to craft a plan that balances diverse interests."

This "intent-to-adopt" management plan covers
Kachemak Bay State Park and Kachemak Bay State
Wilderness Park, as well as in the Eveline, Diamond Creek, and
Overlook Park state recreation sites, an area totaling

approximately 371,000 acres.

It results from Commissioner Feige's decision on Dec. 7, 2018 to replace a previous management plan with one produced with more complete public information and involvement.

MAT-SU BOROUGH RECREATION AND LIBRARY SERVICES

Nov 16: The Mat Su Borough Grooming Crew added a new piece of equipment to our tool box this past week. It's a four foot wide Ginzugroomer from Yellowstone Track Systems. It has the ability to pack the snow, cut icy snow with hydraulic knives, set classic ski tracks, and leave a nice corduroy surface. This Groomer will fit on much narrower trails then our other groomers, so it can be used on the Morgan Equestrian Trail, the Matanuska River Trail, and the new trails at Settlers Bay Coastal Park. We still need more snow to pack some of these trails, but we hope you can get out and enjoy these additional groomed trails as the season progresses.



Nov 12: With low temperatures and fairly early snow, the MSB Grooming Crew has stated packing the local core trails. On Tuesday 11/10/2020 the road system at the Matanuska River Park were packed, as were the Nordic loops at Lazy Mountain. More snow is needed before any classic tracks can be set, but for now, there is some nice corduroy to enjoy. SEWARD DAILY TRAIL REPORT



November 18: In an effort to get more people out fatbiking and cross country skiing on Seward trails,

we have been working on a 5 mile figure 8 loop that is bike and skiable on the Bear Lake - Iditarod trails. We cut back brush in the over grown parts and stamped down the trail with snowshoes. I have ridden it 5 times now and the more it gets pack down the funner and faster it will become.

To complete the loop: Start at the Bear Lake Trail and go 1/2 mile down on the right you will see a ATV trail take that ~1 mile to the junction then take a left follow that out to Stoney Creek and head right down the creek. Jump back on the Iditarod Connector Trail (right) to the main junction take a right. Go 1/4 mile take a left to Tyhacker Trail past Little Bear Lake. Follow that up and over and back down to Bear Lake and take your last left to the parking area.

I am hoping to somehow keep it in riding/skiing condition thru the winter by grooming it with a snow machine. You can also make the trail longer by crossing Stoney Creek and joining up with the Iditarod Trail towards Nash Road! Lots of fun to be had. It would



also be fun to do some group rides! I have also created some Strava segments for those that use that app. Enjoy!

(Currently the trail is all conditions: dirt, large ice puddles, frozen bumpy moose tracks and 5 inches of snow.)

To get to this magical spot, you take a boat ride across the bay from Homer but there are water taxis available at a price most can afford. Don't forget your warm clothes, snacks and emergency needs. Sarah added: "In addition to extra layers we brought a throw bag, ice picks, ice screws, and a pole to test ice thickness since it was different thicknesses in different parts of the lake."



Nov 22: Yesterday, we (members of the Fairbanks Snow Travelers) rode the Dunbar Trail from the Chatanika River, south. We made it to Goldstream Creek near the railroad tracks, and did a lot of trail clearing near that end until it got dark. The trail basically now stops with several down birch trees in its path. We did not encounter any open water, just some frozen overflow. Although, I would certainly not cross Goldstream Creek yet.

Nov 16: If you are going off trail into the mountains educate yourself about avalanche risk, observation and preparedness. Just snow-shoeing around my property I am noticing signs of a dangerous snowpack.

Nov 15: A big aspect of the damage done to the Pinnell Mountain Trail this past fall had to do with the high animal goal of the hunt (5,000) and the two-caribou-per-person bag limit. This information was announced shortly before the hunt and was probably one of the largest reasons so many hunters swarmed to the Steese Highway.

I wondered why this hunt goal and bag limit were announced just a few days before the hunt. Wouldn't announcing it earlier allow law enforcement more time to prepare? Well, after reading "Counting Caribou" and watching the video documentary, I better understand why you can't announce those limits at just any time.


So be alert and steer clear of "Trail Closures" during the next several days on Commuter Trail &


Fox Trot & Shaun's Trail & Rabbit Run alongside the Old Ski Field brush cutting project.

After integrating input from the community and fundraising, we identified a professional land clearing contractor that gave us an affordable price estimate - so we then sought permission from FNSB parks Dept. to carry out the brush clearing project.

Borough staff supported the open-space preservation concept, but required that any work be managed by FNSB





It was a good solution and FNSB Parks has been reasonable and supportive, albeit adding a level of bureaucracy unimagined by us at the outset.

Nov 18: Two on-base trails are now open for cross country skiing. Thanks to Natural Resources, both trails were recently groomed, and have tracks set for cross country skis.

The Parcours is located next to the Natural Resources office and has 1.5 miles of trail. The 'Intermediate Trail' at Iceman Falls offers options for a 2.5 and 5 kilometer loop—stay to your right as you leave the parking lot and follow the tracks. Both of these trails are SKI ONLY and pets are not allowed. Please respect these rules as ski tracks are easily damaged.

The advanced trails at Iceman Falls—stay left as you leave the parking lot—will be groomed later this week. These trails offer 2.5, 5, and 7.5 kilometer loops and provide access to the public cabin. These trails are open to all non-motorized recreation including skiing, snowshoeing, fat tire biking, running, walking, etc. Snow machines are not allowed on any of these trails or the ski hill.

Cross country skis, bike, and snowshoe rentals are available at Iceman Falls Fri.-Sun. 10-6, as well as at Raven's Nest from Tues.-Sat. 10-6. You may download the maps from the Outdoor Rec website: https://tinyurl.com/y4l9lxlc

FUNDS HELP REPAIR WINDFALL LAKE CABIN NEAR JUNEAU

The Windfall Lake Cabin on the Tongass National Forest is a fairly accessible rental cabin in Alaska.

Located outside of Juneau, people can hike 3.3 miles to the cabin or take a floatplane right up to the cabin's dock. The cabin itself is accessible for people with disabilities, with an elevated boardwalk connecting the dock, cabin, and outhouse. A picnic table sits on the front deck and a campfire ring is outside as well. A canoe is available for visitors to use and enjoy the silence that comes from being the only people on the lake.



Unfortunately, the deck and ramp for this cabin were at risk of failing and was deemed unsafe by the Forest Service. Through our Alaska

Forest Fund (https://tinyurl.com/y2tr6vre) and with support from the Rasmuson Foundation, the NFF hired a local contractor to replace deck and ramp using Alaska yellow cedar, extending the life of the cabin and maintaining its accessibility for years to come.

CARES ACT FUNDING HELPS CREATE SITKA CONSERVATION CORPS

The Sitka Conservation Society is turning lemons into trails these days.

SCS created the Sitka Community Conservation Corps with funding from a City 2020 CARES Act



grant. The goals of this Covid-19 recovery funding is to start a CCC-type work corps and provide transitional employment for underemployed and impacted Sitkans.

The SCCCorps has created 9 goodpaying new natural resources jobs in a region seeing severe declines in tourism, fishing, and the service industries.

Crewmembers are working on a wide variety of long-needed maintenance and improvement projects including: building

new mountain bike and walking trails, restoring the flow of water at Goddard Hot Springs, clearing brush

from overgrown cemetaries, cleaning nature trail boardwalks, mapping trail inventory with GIS, revegetating the new Cross Trail, and a host of other projects around Sitka.

The Corps also recently landed on the front page of the Sitka Sentinal for handing out 12,000 pounds of food to Sitka residents. Crewmembers had a humbling experience, seeing traffic backed up for a mile from community members' cars needing this vital assistance.

Recently the crew helped place a bench on Thimbleberry Lake as a memorial to beloved Sitka author, radio host, and anthropologist Richard Nelson.

Nov 25: What are your tips for emergency communication in the backcountry?



No single communication tool is foolproof, so combining several together increases the likelihood that you'll get the help you're seeking. It's also paramount to think about what actions you need to take ahead of your outing for your communication to be successful.

Here's a few things you can do:

Tell someone you trust where you're going, when you expect to be back, and what they should do next if they don't hear

from you.

- Fully charge all your devices along with a powerbank. Pack all relevant cables.
- Look up emergency phone numbers. Depending on where you are, 911 may not be the best option.
 - Conserve your cell phone battery by putting it in airplane mode.
 - Carry a satellite communicator or personal locator beacon with an SOS function.

What else?

Nov 24: Salmon are an important part of our ecosystem, so our trails must always be built with that in mind. This #transformationtuesday takes us to Horse Tram Trail where we upgraded the trail to better support salmon in their journey to their spawning grounds upstream.

Last year, a culvert had been installed to protect a small salmon stream underneath the trail. Working with our partners at ADF&G, Southeast Alaska, a biologist determined the culvert was 'perched,' creating a small waterfall at the outflow that was impassable by small fish, so we sprung into action.

With an excavator, the crew removed the existing culvert, dug holes to lay down sills or foundation pieces, and installed a new bridge. Now both trail users and salmon can traverse this section of stream!



Nov 17: This #transformationtuesday is a big shoutout to our crews who are still out working even

though the landscape looks a little different 🦥



Check out the dedication of these folks! All our crews have been out the road at the Eagle Valley Center ropes course and the new CBJ public use cabin clearing snow off the trail before continuing their usual work of laying down gravel.

Working in these conditions has required problem-solving, teamwork, and mental toughness, but everyone has risen to the challenge, displaying the good spirits and sense of humor we've seen all summer.

Cheers to Maddie, Ambrose, Hunter, Juliette, Edgar, Able, Elias, Laib, Cedar, Mark, Jess, Julio, Annie, and Kim! You all are diamonds.

Nov 13: For this #fallbackfriday, it's the bridge that started it all 10 years ago! The Lawson Creek bridge was the first bridge that Trail Mix built on Treadwell Ditch and is still the largest, weighing in at 27,000lbs of wood and steel and requiring 18 helicopter sling loads.

This summer we built 9 new bridges and with your support, we'll continue working until we reach the northern terminus at Eagle Crest.



Nov 10: This #transformationtuesday is about what's been transpiring at Point Bridget State Park all summer. Swipe to see how new gravel is upgrading this very popular trail.

Our crews started by refilling the existing turnpikes with gravel, which are wooden structures that elevate parts of the trail above the wet ground.

In other sections, they removed old, slippery planks, regraded the terrain, and then put down gravel. Finally, drains were dug to direct water away from the trail, so it doesn't flood.

If you're excited about these changes, we're happy to report that this is only phase 1, so expect more improvements to Point Bridget next season too.
