


## USFS National Strategy for a Sustainable Trail System


- Published in 2016
- Developed with many partners
- New paradigm A Model of Shared Stewardship:
  - from USFS "doing it all"
  - to USFS, trail users, & stakeholders forming a community of stewards
- Sustainable Trail System
  - a holistic network
  - a resilient system
  - well-planned, well-designed, well-constructed, well-managed trails
  - supported by public and private interests
- 26 action items to achieve sustainability includes the 10-Year Trail Challenge



## 10-Year Trail Challenge

- Initiated in February 2020
- Selected a subset of actions from the Strategy
- Heart of challenge is achieving a sustainable system of trails:
  - rely on agency employees, community stakeholders, tribes, partners, and others
  - work together to identify a common vision
  - share capacity for managing the system
  - address unauthorized trails, user-created routes, decommissioning trails, potential new trails, and maintaining existing trails





## Tongass Sustainable Trail Strategy

- Each forest approached the 10-Year Trail
  Challenge in their own way
- The Tongass seeks to identify current and future trail needs across the Forest and in each community
- Eventual goal is to have community-specific sustainable trails plans
- Alaska Trails:
  - key partner
  - gathered baseline trail information
  - conducting community engagements
  - will identify priority trail projects by community
