Aug 28: One of the neat things about working with the Hatcher Pass State Park trail crew is their attention to conservation.

For our project at Independence Mine this Saturday, we will form a fireline to bring gravel up to a new trail in the tundra. While many trail projects in Alaska rely on helicopters and mechanized

equipment, this one is powered by humans.

Tundra is delicate terrain, and social trails establish themselves almost instantly if we veer off designated trails. The Hatcher Pass crew has opted not to use four wheelers to haul gravel to the worksite to reduce impact to the tundra. By hardening the trail with gravel, we will create a more durable, dry walking surface that will help keep people on the trail and reduce "braiding."



Still Time to Give Back to the Trails you Love



Don't listen to those snow happy friends of yours (and ignore that recent snow advisory for the eastern Interior); there's plenty of summer left, leaving you plenty of time to get out and enjoy some of Alaska's great trails. As you read these words, Alaskans are out recreating on trails across the state.

Alaska's trails improve our physical and mental health, boost our economy, and strengthen our social bonds. For residents and visitors alike, trails get us out, keep us active and help us access the outdoors.

While we all enjoy these amazing trails, we don't always consider how they are maintained or built. This summer, Alaska Trails has been teaming up with local land managers to help protect the trails we love and make sure that people can continue to enjoy them. Trail users who want to give back still have the opportunity to join up with other volunteers for a fun and engaging day (or more) of trail work this summer. Our Alaska Trail Stewards program is set to give volunteers all they need to give back to the trails they use and love.

Alaska Trails and Chugach State Park have collaborated all summer on the Middle Fork Trail. There

will be several more events on the Middle Fork in September, highlighted by National Public Lands Day on Saturday, September 28. There are other volunteer days coming up, as well (see story on page 1).

Volunteers have provided lots of labor, this summer and in previous summers. The Alaska Trail Stewards (ATS) volunteer program celebrated a successful 2018 season with 291 volunteers contributing over 1900 hours of labor at 23 separate events. In addition to the trails on Mat-Su Borough land, ATS volunteers worked on

public lands in Chugach State Park, Chugach National Forest, the City of Whittier, and Hatcher Pass State Park - amounting to \$52,644 in donated labor. We are set to surpass that in 2019 with 30 events - thanks to all the great volunteer support.

Summer is cooling off and turning to fall, but there's still time to get out and enjoy the great trails Alaska has to offer. If your schedule permits, we hope to see you at one of our volunteer events. No experience is necessary, just sturdy boots, a good attitude and a willingness to learn what it takes to keep our trails great.

STATE TRAIL PROGRAMS STILL ALIVE AFTER BUDGET BATTLE

Four state trail-related programs have survived the recent battle over the state budget. However, two of the programs were significantly affected.

The Recreational Trails Program (RTP) and Snowmobile Trails Program (STP) now have one less person to administer them. In addition, the State Legislature required that RTP funds be split between the state parks division and local community organizations. (Gov. Mike Dunleavy's administration had earlier tried to distribute RTP funds solely to state parks.) As a result, state employees are still working out how to administer the programs. Applications for them are not yet available. When all that is finalized, the Department of Natural Resources will issue an announcement to let people know they can again apply.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) saw some budget wrangling but survived. The program, which is not solely for trails but considers them "high priority projects," is available to local and regional governments. A call for applications for a new round of LCWF projects should be coming soon.

Matching funds for the Pittman-Robertson program also survived. Like the LWCF, the Pittman-Robertson program is not solely for trails, but it does pay for projects that increase hunter access. In an August interview with the Fairbanks Daily News-Miner (http://tinyurl.com/y3dmh7qd), Doug Vincent-Lang, commissioner of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, said "over the next few years, the department plans to use funds for projects including things like bolstering airstrips and restoring trails and parking lots."

NATIONAL PUBLIC LANDS DAY TO BE CELEBRATED IN SEPTEMBER

VOLUNTEER At least three events will be held in celebration of National Public Lands Day. More are expected to be listed as the day—held this year on Saturday, September 28—comes nearer. Of the three events listed so far, one is definitely trail-related: the Alaska Trail Stewards trail work party on the Middle Fork Trail. For more

FIRST ADA ACCESSIBLE TRAIL BEING BUILT IN MAT-SU BOROUGH

Starting in August, VMBaH has been developing the first trail in a Mat-Su Borough park unit that follows Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) guidelines. The trail is inspired by Amy Schooley, who is wheelchair-bound and was not able to get out on the trails from Government Peak Recreation Area (GPRA) parking lot. Community member, Roy Wahl proposed the ADA trail to VMBaH this past winter and the work to find funding and an appropriate location began. The trail will originate at the main GPRA trailhead and terminate at a picnic area with spectacular views. VMBaH is excited to take this significant first step towards addressing a recreational challenge by developing opportunities for an under-represented user group. Building this new trail will expand trail access in Mat-Su Borough Parks and ensure that trail users of all abilities have recreational opportunities.

STATE PARKS FACEBOOK FULL OF SOUTHCENTRAL TRAIL NEWS

HATCHER PASS

Aug 23: UPDATES ON MAT-SU REGION, the DESHKA FIRES and HUNTING RESTRICTIONS: Independence Mine SHP has a closed the gate at the entrance for staff safety (the smoke was affecting their lungs and eyes) and will not be staffed, but walk-in traffic is allowed.

Nancy Lake State Recreation Area is closed to recreation, however, the campground at Nancy Lake State Recreation Site is open. Access to boat across the lake to personal property is allowed but Lake recreation is closed.

Alaska Department of Fish and Game has issued two orders: 1) an emergency order for Willow Swamp area to be closed to hunting and 2) an order restricting hunting and public access to Willow Swamp area due to the Deshka Landing Fire. Aug 16: Last week's fun walk along the Chester Creek Trail with some of the Health Promoters from Catholic Social Services - Alaska Refugee Assistance and Immigration Services! We've been working with a few community partners over the past year to develop resources that better connect people in the newcomer community to their neighborhood parks.



July 29: The Westchester Lagoon Nature Trail and parking lot rehabilitation is complete and the trail is open again!

The Westchester Lagoon Nature Trail was built in 1977-1978 as an ADA accessible multi-use trail where visitors could access the south banks of Chester Creek and connect to the main Chester Creek Trail. A neighbor dreamed of restoring this public space to its original intent and purpose and applied for an Anchorage Park Foundation Challenge Grant. The project grew from there with involvement from Steller Secondary School through the Schools on Trails program, Alaska Chapter ASLA, Alaska Department of Transportation & Public Facilities, and a Salmon in the City grant from the Alaska Department of Natural Resources. The trail's function as a neighborhood connector to the main Chester Creek Trail makes it a perfect quiet spot to view a wide variety of plants and wildlife; we recommend checking it out!

TRAIL-LADEN BLOCK OF NORTH POLE LAND WITHDRAWN FROM SALE

ADVOCATE Below are excerpts from an email update from Cam Webb, who has been spearheading the "Keep Peede Trails Public" effort. The group has been trying to get some Fairbanks North Star Borough land in the North Pole area set aside for recreational use, especially for motorized, multi-use trails. The land had been nominated for sale in the Salcha-Badger Development Plan. See the group's website at: http://peedetrails4all.org/

The Mayor has decided to withdraw the main Peede Rd. Tract (166 acres) from the Borough land sale, citing the need for more detailed planning of the Chena Annex/Heritage Forest area. You can see the final land sale Ordinance here:

So we can continue to enjoy public access to this area for the near future! Thanks to all of you for your support.

The Assembly work session, when the land sale will be presented in detail to the Assembly by the senior Land Manager, will be on September 5. The Public Hearing and adoption of the Ordinance will be on September 12, concurrent with the adoption of the Salcha-Badger (S-B) Development Plan. If you are still interested in testifying in support of public use of this land, or would like to thank the Mayor or the authors of the S-B Plan (which recognizes our concerns), please come and speak on September 12.

Please note that the two 40-acre lots we were also campaigning for are still for sale (the Florence & Blalock lots, see map). Opinions vary on whether to accept this, or to continue to voice the view that all sales should be delayed until after more planning and review by the Borough and residents. If you are concerned about this ongoing plan to sell the Borough land in the Chena Annex/Heritage Forest area, please testify on September 12.
