July 28

It's #TrailheadTuesday, and today we're heading to the Ridge Trail in Talkeetna.

A big step forward for Talkeetna is the new/reborn Ridge Trail system. This area was originally developed by local volunteers for XC skiing, then became more of a 4-wheeler system. Most recently the Mat Su Borough, working with Jon Underwood of Happy Trails, Inc., built a new multi-purpose/motorized trail, and designated a delightful set of trails for non-motorized biking, walking and winter skiing.

Check out the route on the Borough's "Outer Spatial" trail app, and consider renting a bike (or just getting fudge or a milkshake) at North Shore Cyclery. Find the trail head on



Beaver Road, a bit under 2 miles east from where you leave the Spur Road. Watch for Small parking area on the left, new trail signs on the right.

July 14



It's #TrailheadTuesday! Today's recommendation is the Angel Rocks Trail and comes via Mariyam Medovaya, our Alaska Trails Initiative staff member.

If you are looking for an easy hike with spectacular views, varied terrain and amazing bouldering right outside of Fairbanks, Angel Rocks trail will provide.

July 7

It's TrailheadTuesday! Today's recommendation comes from Melanie Renée: Creamer's Field Boreal Forest Trail in Fairbanks. The 1.5-mile trail winds through a small sample of the largest land ecosystem on Earth: the boreal forest. June 30 It's TrailheadTuesday! Today is a Chugach State Park classic: Rabbit Lake. From the Rabbit Creek Trailhead, follow the road past the gate, onto the trail, and all the way to the lake. Great for a mellow weekend jaunt or a quick after work run, hike, or bike on a sunny evening.

The Alaska Long Trail is a different concept than the Trans-Alaska Trail (http://aktrail.org/), which would turn the gravel pad of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline into a long trail from Valdez to Deadhorse. The concept of the Alaska Long Trail currently runs between Seward and Fairbanks. While different, the two concepts are not necessarily mutually exclusive. If both are completed, they could meet in Fairbanks, providing for more routing options.

WATCH FOR BIRD NESTS WHEN WORKING ON TRAILS

Trail work sometimes requires downing trees or clearing shrubs. When doing so make sure not to violate the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, which makes it illegal for anyone to "take" migratory birds, their eggs, feathers, or nests. "Take" includes destroying or damaging active bird nests or eggs. Different areas of the state have different sensitive periods generally occurring between April 15 and July 25. However, if you encounter an active nest at any time leave it in place and protected until young hatch and depart. "Active" is indicated by intact eggs, live chicks, or the presence of an adult on the nest.

LATEST FROM YOUTH EMPLOYMENT IN PARKS: YEP, IT'S HAPPENING

The Anchorage Park Foundation announced in June that YEP (Youth Employment in Parks) would be happening, though in a modified form due to the pandemic. Below is an article from the foundation. There was uncertainty this spring as to whether Youth Employment in Parks (YEP) would take place this year, given the challenges posed by novel coronavirus. We are happy to announce that YEP is indeed taking place in 2020, though it looks guite different from how it has looked in the past.

YEP is an inclusive summer employment program that provides Anchorage teens with hands-on experience in stewardship and conservation of public lands, while giving many participants experience in their first summer jobs. Youth Employment in Parks had a phased start, this year. In May, crews consisted only of a few returning crew leaders. These crew leaders were working on smaller projects, like tree plantings or clearings, for the past five weeks. Starting this week, YEP is operating with a full



crew, training 21 teenagers new to the program.

With the program scaling up this week, the YEP crew is separated into three smaller groups to ensure social distancing. Face masks are required, provided by YEP, and were created by local artist Brett Connor of Hulin Designs. Crew members have their own tools, are required to wash their hands a minimum of three times per day, and have access to hand sanitizer. Temperatures are also taken every morning. The safety measures don't stop there: tools are sanitized at the end of every day, and crew members transport themselves to work sites, rather than traveling together in vans.

The YEP program is off to a great start. One of the hopes for this year is that, with smaller groups, YEP crew members can form closer bonds with one another. Teaching the essentials of teamwork is still a core focus for the program, and coordinators believe that the teens have an increased opportunity to demonstrate leadership skills in their smaller crews.

Even with all the adaptations, we at APF are thrilled that Anchorage teens still have a valuable opportunity this summer, earning money while learning some central principles of stewardship and conservation. In the words of Meredith Gutierrez, the program's field educator, "we still get to make a difference through the program."

YEP staff have seen personal growth and team building for teens foregrounded again and again in the life of the program. This year, we believe, will be no exception. Thank you to the many supporters who make YEP possible. Stay tuned to Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube for updates from days in the life of our YEP crews.

July 28: **Update in Mat-Su Region**



A bear has been hanging around Willow Creek State Recreation Area in the campground and along the trail to the river.

Signs are posted but please note that bears hang out when salmon are running and this one is setting up camp. Be aware and always be prepared for an animal encounter.

July 24: **Kachemak Bay area update**

We have received reports that a sow (aka: mama bear) with cubs around Grewingk Lake has been showing signs of stress recently. The sow has been making huffing sounds and they are not moving off the trail.

Please inform us of this type of behavior as it is very important to get the word out via trail reports and signage at trail heads and at the lake. This type behavior can escalate to a more dangerous encounter if the sow feels more threatened by hikers.

BIG thanks to the commercial operators that have been informing the public about bear sightings and how to properly deal with unexpected bear behavior, especially in the Grewingk Valley and Saddle Trail. Keep it up! Please be certain that if your

operation has multiple employees working in the park, that they understand the importance of reporting these encounters to us.

Our goal is to provide an awesome and safe experience for the everyone.

July 8: Wow! Have you been out to Settlers Bay Park recently?

Great Land Trust partnered with the Mat-Su Trails and Parks Foundation, other community organizations, and individual supporters to acquire 293-acres of undeveloped coastal property in the Settlers Bay community with the intent to create a park for public recreation and habitat conservation.

Settlers Bay Park officially opened to the public last Fall. The Mat-Su Borough manages the land and has been working hard to provide a multitude of recreation opportunities, to protect wildlife and historical sites, and offer educational opportunities for school children, families, and visitors to the park.

MAT-SU BOROUGH RECREATION AND LIBRARY SERVICES



July 31: Exciting things are happening at the new Settlers Bay Coastal Park! This week the Mat-Su Trail Crew completed cutting the tread of 1.8 miles of beginner friendly mountain bike trail! This trail is relatively flat and flowy with some banked turns, as you can see in the picture! There is still some dirt work and root cutting that needs to happen before the trail is finished, but hopefully that will be completed by fall. We hope you get a chance to check out the new park and trail system.

ISLAND TRAILS NETWORK (KODIAK)

July 31: The trail crew that brushed all the Near Island trails helped to clean all the beaches on Near Island too! The morning started with a stretch circle at the first beach on North End Trail. The beaches on North End and South End were fairly clean, but they still managed to collect 96 pounds of marine debris. The crew learned that although beach cleanups are important, it is not the solution. The solution lies in the choices of each individual and to practice the 4 R's: to refuse, reuse, reduce, and recycle. The goal is to stop marine debris from entering the ocean in the first place.



July 25: Thank you all who came out and cleared the Monashka trail! All of your work is much appreciated!

July 24: Marcus Dunbar (retired teacher and former track and field coach) is leading a crew of seven high schoolers for the month of July to complete the Channelside Trail on Near Island.

The trail starts on the North End trail, continues underneath the Near Island bridge, follows alongside the Near Island office buildings, and ends close to St. Herman's Harbor. This trail is heavily used by the Kodiak track and field team, some of which the crew members are on.

A donation from Michelle Parekh made it possible to finish the construction of this trail, which was put on hold for a few years. The donation was originally intended for the 2020 Brian Young



Invitational Alaska Star Track and Field Meet which unfortunately was canceled due to COVID-19. Dunbar asked if the donation could support the completion of the Channelside Trail and Parekh gladly agreed.

The track and field team will now have better trails to practice on to prepare for next year's track meet.

July 23: Travis is back as the Trails Coordinator this summer and started a 6-week summer work



program, running from June 26th to July 31st with a trail crew of five Kodiak youth. This program is sponsored by The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR). It directly targets ITN's mission by maintaining our local trails as well as providing employment skills training specific for the outdoor, conservation, and natural resources career fields.

The crew has been working hard brushing the trails on Near Island, starting with the North End Trail. They finished the Near Island trails, continued to some of the Adjust Your Altitude trails, worked in the State Parks and are finishing up at Termination Point.

To round off the crew, ITN is also hosting a local Student Conservation Association intern, Matthew Wald, who provides mentorship and developing leadership skills.

July 12: We had a great turnout for today's trail maintenance on Heitman trail; thank you for everyone who came out! We widened the trail from the trailhead to the lake. Happy hiking!

ASSEMBLY VOTES TO PROTECT SOME PEEDE AREA TRAILS

Cam Webb, organizer of the "Keep Peede Trails Public" campaign, sent out this email on July 23.

Great news! The Borough Assembly just voted unanimously to rezone the Peede Tract (the 166-acre parcel at the heart of the Borough's Brock/Repp land) to 'Outdoor Recreation'. This should now prevent sale and development of this parcel.

There's lots more work to do to keep the rest of the land public, but any new action on that is probably some time out.

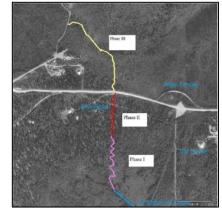

USE A NEW TRAIL July 24: The Section Line Trail has been brushed out - it needs traffic to wear in.

For decades RCN tried to get year round access to the chute but it was not to be. FNSB pointed out the section line and after year of effort DNR determined that there is a 66 foot easement along the section line and approved brushing out a trail. Reminds me of the Rolling Stones song - You can't always get what you want....you get what you need. No longer do you have to worry that the property owner will accost you for being on the chute or zipper. RCN only has race day permission to use the trail.

From the intersection of Styx Road and Ester Dome Rd the new trail goes both directions North and South. The South trail drops off the edge of Styx Road and the North trail starts on the original Equinox but goes straight along the section line.



Watch for trip hazards as it is a rough trail. Please don't cut the switchbacks. Enjoy!

It's worth noting that the affected property owners have been notified. They don't necessarily like it, but DNR has made a determination that a section line easement that permits public access exists there. Please respect private property and stay on the trail.

CONGRESS PASSES BIPARTISAN GREAT AMERICAN OUTDOORS ACT

In July, the House of Representatives passed the Great American Outdoors Act, a bill that would authorize billions in funding for two major park-related needs, the National Park Service deferred maintenance backlog and the Land and Water Conservation Fund. It now heads to the White House, where President Trump is expected to sign the bill into law.

"This bill is a conservationist's dream," said National Parks Conservation Association President and CEO Theresa Pierno.

The legislation includes components from two previous bills that NPCA has strongly supported, the Restore Our Parks Act and the Land and Water Conservation Fund Permanent Funding Act.
