



ADVOCACY NEEDED FOR RECREATIONAL TRAILS PROGRAM

ADVOCATE The Senate bipartisan infrastructure bill left the Recreational Trails Program (RTP) completely untouched, relegating it to stagnant funding once again. According to the recently released Federal Highway Administration report, the nation's trails community currently contributes \$281 million in tax revenue each year, yet for the last ten years the program has been held at flat funding of only \$84 million. From an equity and climate standpoint, the budget reconciliation represents an opportunity to invest in our nation's recreational trails for the first time in nearly a decade.

There is clear benefit to ensuring states and localities can access the funds needed to expand their active trail networks, ensure outdoor recreation is a part of the clean energy transition, provide safe and healthy outdoor spaces for all communities, and encourage greater carbon-free modes of transportation. Several members of Congress have sent a letter asking that the reconciliation package include funding for the RTP that brings it up to the \$147 million per year included in the INVEST Act.

You can help. Send a copy of the letter to our federal representatives to let them know you support fair and accurate funding of the RTP. You can print the letter and send it via snail mail or copy the content and email it.

OUTDOOR REC TRAILS ADVISORY BOARD SEEKS NEW MEMBERS

APPLY The Division of Parks and Outdoor Recreation is seeking multiple candidates to fill two (2) volunteer positions, representing Motorized trail users, for the Outdoor Recreational Trails Advisory Board (ORTAB). Applicants should have knowledge, experience, and interest in outdoor recreational activities and grant-funded programs. This is a Commissioner-appointed position with a three-year term, and the board meets a minimum of twice per year.

The primary role of the ORTAB is to assist in evaluating grant proposals for the Recreational Trails Program (RTP) and Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). Since 2000, these programs have invested over 30 million dollars in trail projects throughout the state, creating critical and sustainable infrastructure while supporting private sector jobs throughout Alaska. Because ORTAB members carry a wide array of trail and public land user experiences, they are occasionally asked for additional advice on other outdoor recreation related subjects. INCIDENT DRAWS ATTENTION TO HORSE INTERACTIONS ON TRAILS

The following was excerted from a post on the Fairbanks Area Hiking Club Facebook page earlier this summer. It has useful information for any non-equestrian trail user who comes across horses while out on the trail. (Note: The photo is from an Alaska Trails public service campaign several years ago; it did not accompany the post.)

After an event this evening at Chena flood plains I feel like I need to just educate a little. Maybe a few



people will learn something and we can all have better interactions on the trails.

When hiking, especially with our favorite K9s, and you come across horses on the trail. Please just step off but stay in sight. It's helpful if you talk to us on the horses while you do that. We will let you know if there is something special to do that will help our horses stay calm.

99% of my interactions with fellow hikers while I am on horseback are amazing. Not everyone knows what to do but everyone in the past has been receptive to directions

from us. I know no one wants any one of us 2 or 4 legged to be hurt.

What occurred tonight was extremely dangerous for us. My repeated attempts to try to calm the situation were met with this individual with two (well behaved and leashed) dogs by them yelling at us to move on.

We can't move on when our horse is rearing and spinning (first time this has ever happened to us to this extent in this scenerio). My 13 yr old daughter handled her big 1200 lb horse very well.

A dog hiding in the woods is a predator to a horse and in their mind we are asking them to just walk towards something that wants to kill it. Please excuse us and give us a minute to calm them down. It's way easier when they can see your dog. For my horses they don't care if they are barking and jumping. They are use to that. They just care that something is in the woods and it's for sure going to kill them right then and there.

Thank you everyone. Hope to see you on the trails this fall and in seasons to come with our pony's.





GROUP CONTINUES WORK ON SHOUP BAY TRAIL NEAR VALDEZ

VAA (Valdez Adventure Alliance) is thrilled to announce that the request to continue work on Shoup

Bay Trail has finally been approved!

In the summer of 2020 VAA rehabilitated the first section of Shoup Bay Trail. Some of you have been wondering why this did not continue in 2021. In October of 2020 we submitted for an RTP grant and permission to continue the work. However, since the second section of work included replacing the footings for the bridge over an active stream, a full environmental review process was required at both the state and federal levels.

Unfortunately, the job position responsible for those reviews was vacant at



both the state and federal levels. So, other state and federal employees had to review the submitted projects in addition to conducting their regular jobs. The project work has just now been approved! Too late for summer 2021, but will begin as soon as possible in summer 2022.

NEW TRAIL CONSTRUCTION RESUMES ON KODIAK'S NEAR ISLAND

We are in mid-construction of a new trail on the south end of Near Island that will be completed and opened next summer, possibly earlier. It is fairly well hidden from daily traffic, but the bench is 80% cut



and we already have some gravel down. The trail runs south along the coast-line from Trident Basin and brings the trail out of the heavy tree fall area. From there we hope to connect from South End to Channel Side via the boat harbor and then have a continuous trail that completes the circumference of the island. Marcus Dunbar is responsible for this effort, and Andy helped with the layout. Marcus led a crew of eight Kodiak high schoolers working on the trail for two months this summer. Michelle Kouremetius-Parekh has continued to support the

project as a sponsor (The Kouremetis Family). The lower trail will be clear of any windfall threat and be considerably better designed, scenic and more enjoyable than the old trail.

Sept 15: Did you know? Tsunamis don't just happen at sea level! **Kachemak SP: Grewingk Lake with views of the glacier is a popular hiking destination spot -- and we can see why!

It's also the subject of ongoing studies on a wild phenomenon that happens under very unique circumstances (and only in a handful of places in Alaska). But it's happened here before! In 1967, a landslide triggered a mega wave that scoured this seemingly sleepy valley and washed everything in its path out into the bay (over 4 miles away).

INCIDENTAL "MIGRATION" OF LOCAL TRAILS CAUSES PROBLEMS

A couple of local trails are starting to make small migrations from their regular routes. These changes can harm trees and widen trails unnecessarily. Please proceed with care.

Both Secret Trail, in Skyline Ridge Park, and Cranberry Trail, on the ridge above the Vallata, are having this problem. First a trail is established that goes around trees. Then people start walking around the other side of the tree. This happens for a couple of reasons. As trails get more packed down with use, the roots become more pronounced and make for more difficult footing or biking. On sidehills, trails tend to migrate downhill, which also leads to people taking a "shortcut" by going below a



tree or two. This has happened on sections of the Skarland Trail that haven't been benchcut.

These trail changes are usually not done with a lot of thought and can cause problems. While moving a trail to another side of a tree to avoid pronounced roots can temporarily make for better footing, eventually the roots become pronounced on the other side of the tree as well. Then the footing is just as

difficult on both sides of the tree. Unfortunately, this unduly stresses the trees and can cause them to die sooner than they would have. It also makes for a wider trail.

Trails that migrate downhill in one portion only usually make another portion of the trail steeper as it regains its original route. In a worst-case scenario, a trail could move out of it's legal easement.

Occasionally, a trail moves for a good reason. The original layout of the trail may not be the best. For example, bikers might reroute around a too-tight space between trees or skiers might need a wider turn. Such changes, though, should be done only if truly needed.

Some trail stewards have placed logs or brush across the trail on one side of the tree to guide trail users to the other side. Please leave these in place unless you have a really good reason to make the change. If you see that the log has been replaced on your return, consider leaving a note (in a plastic bag) with your name and contact information so that you can talk to the person who is making the change. A civil discussion can often clear up disagreements. If you are not comfortable leaving your name and contact info, at least leave a note explaining your reasoning. Both have worked in the past.

Please be mindful of how you are using the trails. Keep in mind that your actions affect others, including the plants and animals that make up the are you are moving through. And remember that while you are just one person, you are one of many and the many can have a great impact.

Mark your calendar for these two Trails Advisory Commission meetings (via Zoom) to review and provide feedback on the recommended trail corridors.

Sept 30: The September 27 meeting packet of the Fairbanks Borough Trails Advisory Commission has some interesting letters attached. Three groups are applying for Recreational Trails Program grants for trail improvements in the area. They are:

- --FNSB Parks and Rec: Develop proper trailhead and parking area for Skyline Ridge trail system.
- --Interior Alaska Trails & Parks Foundation: Build multi-use trails linking existing Tanana Valley State Forest roads.
- --Interior Alaska Land Trust: Construction of the Chinook Conservation Park ATV Trail.

The TAC is also advocating Fairbanks Borough Mayor Bryce Ward to include the following trail projects in the 2020 Capital Improvement Program list.

- --Trail-a-Year Program: Develop public access for the Borough trail system
- --Equinox Marathon Trail completion

- --Skyline Ridge trail system development
- --Isberg Recreation Area Master Plan implementation
- --Peede Road open space tract access development



Sept 28: Busting news! The two ends of the Cross Trail have finally met! The Sitka Trail Works crew has successfully excavated down to Watlachéix'k'i Héen (No Name Creek). Once spawning season is over, we'll install the bridge, which will connect the trail from Starrigavan to Kaasda Héen (Indian River).

Active construction with heavy machinery is ongoing, so be cautious if you venture out on the trail. Also, we appreciate your help in making a beautiful trail by keeping dogs off newly seeded grass areas. Sept 16: Have you ever walked along the Kaasda Héen (Indian River) flume? The water supply pipe makes a way along one of the most beautiful sections of river. The community identified the trail as a priority for construction in 2003, but right-of-way hurdles have impeded progress so far. Instead, a separated pathway was constructed along Indian River Road.

Sept 28: It was all hands on deck out at Point Bridget the past few weeks! To improve the trail, we first removed a ton of old, slippery boardwalk. Much of this boardwalk was rotting away or falling into puddles on the trail. Once the boardwalk was out, crews began to add gravel to the trail.

We worked to improve the trail by adding gravel and increasing drainage. Over the past few weeks, crew members emptied over 70 bags of gravel to create a much sturdier trail. We also installed some new culverts to direct the flow of water.

Shoutout to Liam, Sarah, Owen, Meghan, Jesse, Jean, Julio, Sage, and Dane for their work on this project!

Sept 27: Our crews continued their work at the Eagle Valley Center, Point Bridget, and Treadwell Ditch last week. The walkway is moving along and looking great at the Eagle Valley Center. The crew at Point Bridget finished up their trail improvements for the season. Our Treadwell crew prepared bags of gravel that will be flown out when there's a weather window.





Sept 23: Exciting news! With the help of the JDHS Alpine Club, we have begun the long-awaited restoration of the connection between Cope Park and the Flume.

Sept 20: The days are getting shorter but our crews are working harder than ever. Last week the crew out at Point Bridget emptied just over 40 gravel bags. Each bag is filled with about 500 pounds of gravel! The trail at Point Bridget is looking much less muddy and is close to finished.

Meanwhile, our crew at the Eagle Valley Center finished adding in the support piers with the helical pile driver. They've begun construction on the new walkway and are at the halfway point. We can't wait to see the finished product!





September 14: It's been a bridge-building extravaganza on Treadwell Ditch!

In just a few short weeks, four new bridges have been installed by our Ditch crew. Some of these replaced old, basic wood structures while others created safe passage across gulleys that were cumbersome to cross.

The bridges range in size from 16 to 23 feet long and are all located within a mile of each other just south of the Bonnie Brae access trail.

Big thanks to our team of bridge-building experts, Dane, Jean, Jesse, Julio, and Garrett, who even camped out for a week in order to maximize their time out on trail. And a preemptive shoutout to our Trail Maintenance Volunteer Team, who is in charge of building the approaches, so there is a seamless transition from the trail surface to the start of each bridge.

September 13: Last week was amazing! Our Treadwell crew finished up the four smaller-scale bridges they've been working on and they look great. Another crew continued work out at the Eagle Valley Center. There, they began construction on the new elevated walkway. Out a Point Bridget, a crew continued filling in the old trail with gravel and removing boardwalk.

the heavy rains, a section of the trail washed out and became clogged with debris. Water was starting to accumulate on the trail and the drains were overwhelmed.

Luckily, we were able to quickly fix those issues to get one of Juneau's favorite trails back in tip-top shape. One of our crews worked to remove all the branches and mud that covered the trail. Then, they added in two new culverts to assist in funneling water under and away from the trail. Once the

culverts were in place, crew members added fresh gravel to the areas of the trail that had eroded away. **Thank you to Owen, Liam, and Meghan for your hard work on this trail! **

September 6: Trail Report Week 16

What a busy week! One of our crews headed out to Outer Point to install culverts and fix an eroded section of the trail. While they were over there, the Treadwell crew continued their impressive bridge building. They are very close to having the four bridges completed.

Over at the Eagle Valley Center, a crew finished installing the piers that will form the foundation of the new elevated walkway. Now, they are starting to assemble materials and lumber to begin construction on the walkway. Out at Point Bridget, we flew 70 bags of gravel out to the trail! These bags will be emptied onto the trail and will replace the old boardwalk with a fresh trail.

JUNEAU PARKS & RECREATION

Sept 20: Over the summer, Juneau Parks & Recreation conducted an informal survey to better



understand the current recreational uses, ideas for improvements, and community values for recreation in the Montana Creek Area. The results from the survey are being used to develop and guide the master plan process. The feedback from the survey informs questions to ask of the community and draft concepts to prepare for review. The survey results will not be used to make policy decisions or determine development and management of the area. The results are the first step in public engagement to begin a conversation with the community and land managers. Find the

During the month of September, land managers will meet with stakeholder groups in the area to understand their goals and vision for the process and project area. With this information, concept drawings and plans will be developed for community input and review at a public meeting. The process will include multiple opportunities for public input throughout the fall and early winter.

September 9: With the help of Southeast Alaska Watershed Coalition, our Parks Rangers recently installed a pond leveler device along the Outer Point Trail. It has lowered the pond level 11 inches and will prevent flooding previously created by the resident beavers. It is important for park visitors and hikers to not breach the dam or any of the three tiered impoundments in the area.



Our Rangers call it the 'Beaver Deceiver,' eand it looks to be doing its job!

NATIONAL RECREATION TRAIL APPLICATIONS DUE SOON

APPLY Some applications for designating a trail as a National Recreation Trail are due by November 1.



For trails on private, city, county, or state land, or on federal land NOT overseen by the Department of Agriculture, the designation process goes through the U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI). Those applications are due on November 1 of each year.

For trails on National Forests, National Grasslands, and National Recreation Areas and associated lands, the designation process goes through the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Those may be submitted anytime, but must be submitted

by February 15 to be included in publicity with DOI designations each June.
