
ALASKA LONG TRAIL PROJECTS PASSED BY LEGISLATURE

Alaska Trails is thrilled that 15 Alaska Long Trails projects were included in the budget passed by the State Legislature last week. This joint effort by the bipartisan group of legislators and trails advocates clearly demonstrates that trails are for everyone, a good investment, and something we can all agree on. Such investment in public health and the outdoor recreation economy would be a huge step forward for the State of Alaska. Next stop, the Governor's desk for budget approval.

Looking Forward to a Great Summer Season in 2022



Summer is coming fast, and Alaska Trails is ready! We kicked off the summer season with our annual trails conference in April and have been keeping the momentum going ever since. Here are some of the exciting highlights:

New Crews!

Alaska Trails will have two paid crews again this year. They both started in mid-May with a week of training, including chainsaw training thanks to our partnership with the US Forest Service. One crew headed to Cordova on May 29 and will spend the summer there working on two different projects on the McKinley Lake Trail and at Child's Glacier. The other crew will split its time between Chugach State Park and USFS trails in the road accessible portions of Chugach National Forest.

Youth Employment in Parks

We are grateful that Ben Ervin is returning to lead the Youth Employment in Parks (YEP) program again this year. Alaska Trails is honored to be part of this innovative collaboration



with the Anchorage Park Foundation and the City of Anchorage. Through a 10-week summer program, Anchorage teens complete park improvement projects. Teens learn natural resource management job skills by building trails and restoring stream banks while increasing civic engagement, environmental awareness, and leadership skills. Ben will be leading the teens on some great projects this summer.

Volunteer Crew Leader Training

Alaska Trails is fortunate to have a core group of super volunteers who continue to lead the Alaska Trail Stewards volunteer program. Those volunteers stepped up again in May to conduct a volunteer crew leader training to pass on their knowledge and skills to others who will lead volunteers during our events this summer. With one day in the classroom (mostly an outdoor classroom) and one day in the field, this training sought to teach leaders how to do good work while keeping it both safe and fun.

Those leaders will get to hone their skills soon as the volunteer events begin on **National Trails Day – June 4**th! (See story on page 1.) We have many other volunteer opportunities throughout the summer.

Trails have been so important for all of us through the Covid-19 pandemic. Alaska's trails improve our physical and mental health, boost and diversify our economy in ways that we need to further foster. Trails strengthen our community and give us ways, close to home, to get exercise and recharge.

There are wildfires currently burning throughout the state and the number is growing, so make sure to be responsible with campfires and other open flames this year. Nature doesn't care about your vacation. It happens. Every year.



MAT-SU BOROUGH BIKE AND PEDESTRIAN PLANNING

PARTICIPATE Now is the time to get involved in the borough's bike and pedestrian planning process. In a still-young but ever-expanding community, infrastructure creating more active transportation is critical. And we are guessing that you know where the gaps and problems exist now. The borough has developed a tool



where you can add your ideas about better infrastructure and log concerns about existing designs. Check out the comment map here: https://tinyurl.com/6cnu934u. This is a borough-wide project.

Several communities within the borough will be the primary focus of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan which are: Chickaloon, Houston, Palmer, Sutton, Talkeetna, Wasilla, and Willow. Within these communities, the bike and pedestrian network will be evaluated, and recommendations will be provided.

The plan will also look for opportunities to connect communities with the existing recreation and backcountry trail systems in the surrounding area. The areas between the communities that are along state highways will require Alaska Department of Transportation to be ultimately responsible for creating and maintaining trails.

Since its inception in 2005, the program has awarded \$2 million in funding to 120 volunteer-led projects that have leveraged nearly \$5 million in cash and volunteer match to improve parks and trails. We were also able to celebrate more than 15 years of friendship and support from Rasmuson CEO Diane Kaplan, who is retiring this year. She was with us from the start and we are grateful for her talent and vast contributions to Alaska. We can't wait to see what she does next!

COMMENTS FOR FAIRBANKS TRAIL PLAN DRAFT DUE IN JUNE

COMMENT The comment period for the Fairbanks Comprehensive Recreational Trail Plan Draft will run through June 26.

The process has already had several public meetings and notices with lots of opportunities to comment, but if you haven't had a chance yet to comment (or you've thought of something new to add), please comment soon. The planning team will need time to incorporate your input where appropriate into the Final Plan. The Fairbanks Borough Trails Advisory Commission will review the final plan at its regular July meeting.

Stan Justice, a local trail advocate, would like to see list of reasons ideas were rejected from the plan, such as a trail crossing private property without a public easement. Justice knows many ideas will not be on the plan, so at minimum a list of reasons why an idea might have been rejected would be helpful. A list of trail ideas that were rejected and why would also be helpful. Better to know the reasons rather than let imaginations go in wrong directions.

SPRING TRAIL REPORTS HELP PROTECT VULNERABLE TRAILS

Trails in Interior Alaska are vulnerable this time of year. As the snow melts it uncovers trails that are soft and muddy. We can create ruts and other damage that will last the rest of the season (or longer). Let's try to stay off fragile trails as long as we can and use well-drained trails that are ready for use. To see which trails are ready for use, check out the 2022 Spring Trail Reports, which are updated at least weekly: https://tinyurl.com/2n74wypr

Team chainsawed through approximately 100 downed trees blocking the trail (yes, that's in addition to the 27 earlier this winter (a) and fixed a washout below one of the bridges.

To fix the washout, they first had to unblock the bridge underpass as an obstruction had caused the water to divert down the trail and erode the path for ~100 ft. After water was flowing freely again, they set about moving all the material deposited at the bottom of the incline back to the top in order to bring the trail level with the bridge again.

How can we work with the beavers instead of against them? We install beaver deceivers! 3 We spent



a week out at Southeast Alaska Land Trust's Very Beary Berry Patch learning how to install a beaver deceiver. Beaver deceivers help protect important ecosystems. Beavers are able to remain in their own space, and the ponds they create provide habitat for migrating birds.

Beaver deceivers provide a way for water to flow through a beaver dam without the beavers noticing. For this project, we removed an old beaver deceiver that had gone awry and reinstalled it. While the end result doesn't look like much, that's the point. Beaver decievers are made to be incognito and blend into the surroundings.

As beavers continue to make their home in Southeast Alaska, we're happy to add "beaver deceiver installation" to our toolkit to protect our trails and important ecosystems.

Winter precipitation had eroded the trail right before the beach, so a crew reshaped that section with shovels and rakes and put the gravel back where it belonged. The new tread was then compacted using tampers. The edges of the trail were also lined with big rocks, which will help hold everything in place, which is called turnpiking.

To prevent future erosion, crew members widened trenches on either side of the trail to allow water to easily drain off the surface of the trail and checked on the culverts that allow water to flow underneath the trail rather than over it.

With legal riding areas on the decline since the 1970s despite continued demand, a proposal for

Juneau's first off-road vehicle park received a T.R.A.I.L.S. grant from Polaris Inc. Located at the 35 mile marker out the road, the park is being developed by Juneau Parks & Recreation in partnership with the Juneau Off-Road Association and with support from Trail Mix. The \$10,000 award will fund design plans.

We believe everyone should be able to access and enjoy the outdoors in a responsible manner, and that's why we're grateful to Polaris for helping us move one step closer to addressing this park system gap.

May 27: The Chíx'i Héen (No Name Creek) bridge is built!

While not fully complete, the Cross Trail now spans from Indian River to Starrigavan. Work remains to add surfacing gravel, and we're currently seeking funds to finish the Connector Trail to Halibut Point Road.

The idea for this trail across town dates to the 1970s and was formalized in the 2003 Sitka Trail

Plan. Since then, Sitka Trail Works has doggedly pursued funding to construct the multi-modal trail, raising over \$5 million mostly from federal sources. Following former executive director Deborah Lyons, Lynne Brandon has led the way with dedicated project management and grant writing acumen. Every step of the way, the City & Borough of Sitka has been a key partner and will assume management of the trail once constructed.




Sitka Trail Works foreman Troy Bayne and crew have dedicated thousands of hours of clearing,

excavation, hauling, and artful trail construction. Their work continues, so you may use the trail, but please give a wide berth to any machinery you encounter.

We're not done yet, but it's a worthwhile moment to pause and celebrate a major milestone.

May 5: A PSA from our partners at the Forest Service about a closure at Starrigavan: The Forest Service, Tongass National Forest, Sitka Ranger District with funding from the State of



Alaska DOT and the ADF&G – Hunter Access Program, will begin stream and trail restoration work within the Starrigavan watershed to benefit fisheries, wildlife and user access impacted from a large landslide that occurred in 2014.

Work will begin May 9th, 2022 and lasting through approximately July 29, 2022. Access to the main OHV parking lot and all or portions of the OHV trail will be limited during certain timeframes of these dates due to equipment and supply staging (parking lot) and haul access to the work area (trail system).

Users of the area are encouraged to use

the available parking lot at the small rock pit along the Nelson Logging Road to avoid interfering with construction activities and operations. Please watch for and respect signage during this construction window for your own and contractor's safety.
